

An inmate in New Brunswick recently shared with us how her pain of being separated from her child was eased by the Angel Tree Christmas initiative. She shares,

*"I just want to say thank PFC and for Angel Tree Christmas existing. As a mother unable to spend Christmas with my son, I deeply appreciate what you do for us who are in prison. No child deserves to suffer for our mistakes or circumstances. I've spent three Christmases, going on four now without seeing or being with my son. I cannot even express the feelings of pain which abide in my heart. I've never been away from my son ever before."*

# Aftercare Program

It is our desire at PFC to develop our Aftercare Program across Canada. This year we began our pilot site in Brockville. In partnership with New Life Prison Ministries, we provided a training for individuals and church communities in the Ottawa/Kingston area on Jan 16, 2016. This training provided an opportunity to learn about the multifaceted challenges inmates face in their transition back into community life.

After their release from prison, ex-inmates face a difficult transition in the community. During this time, former offenders encounter immediate challenges; reconnecting with family, finding a place to live, finding job opportunities and building a safe community. In the absence of these material, psychological, and social supports, ex-inmates have a high probability of reoffending within 30 days of release.

Tim Horne, Director of Aftercare at New Life Prison Ministries has been serving in prison ministry since 1984 and he shared about the vital role of church communities in the restoration of ex-inmates. Not only does the ex-inmate need the church to create positive social and spiritual support systems, but

equally important, the church needs to be involved in the ministry to ex-inmates. He exhorted, "The Church has so much to learn from their stories of resilience and can be reinvigorated through stories of triumph and hope."

In the afternoon, the participants played a game called ONElife that was developed by Prison Fellowship Canada to simulate the plight of ex-inmates within thirty days of their release from prison. The purpose of the game is to engage communities in understanding how the pillars of stability (housing, relationships and employment) affect the successfulness of an inmate's re-entry process. It is a known fact that keeping inmates isolated in prison and from community will continue the cycle of crime, increase the risk of mental illness and anti-social behaviour. We encourage the Canadian Church to enter into a relationship with, "the least of these" and share the spiritual journey together.

*Forty percent of released prisoners re-offend within 30 days of release because they can not get their pillars of stability in place.*
