SESSION 6: THE POWER OF WORDS

Key Ideas for This Session:

- The words (language) we use reflect our attitudes, values, and character.
- Thoughtless word choice and inappropriate language can undermine trust and lead to conflict.
- Words can either be tools or weapons; they can hurt or they can heal.
- Habits of using inappropriate or sloppy language can be changed with practice over time.
- Key verse: Proverbs 16:24:
 Gracious words are a honeycomb, sweet to the soul and healing to the bones.

If Actions Speak Louder Than Words, Do Words Even Matter?

Words matter a lot if we want our intended message to be understood by others. The words we choose reflect a lot about who we are in terms of our character, our values, and our attitudes. If we choose our words thoughtfully, other people notice.

People who have worked hard to express themselves through good language and the right use of words tend to receive greater respect from others. Poor word choices and sloppy or inappropriate language often lead to conflict and invite misunderstandings.

Harsh words and demeaning language can even lead to physical violence. The language we use can either be a tool or a weapon. Words can either contribute to healthy interpersonal relationships or undermine and destroy them.

It's important to understand that the words we use are often habitual especially when it comes to slang and swearing. Such language habits may feel natural and ingrained, but they can be replaced with time and intentional effort.

ROLE PLAY
